Metro Nashville Public Schools is one of the nation's largest school districts—serving more than 80,000 students in 158 MNPS schools. MNPS works hand-in-hand with students, staff, families and the Nashville community to ensure every child is served and provided the appropriate needs because MNPS knows developing the whole child, in and out of school, is critical to building a strong community.

# \$1,105,502,500 OPERATING BUDGET

The 22-23 budget invested in employee compensation to ensure more competitive pay for bus drivers and other support staff, along with paid family leave and continued investments to have the highest paid teachers in Tennessee.

### \$765.2 MILLION ALLOCATED DIRECTLY TO SCHOOLS THROUGH STUDENT-BASED BUDGETING

Through student-based budgeting, money is allocated to schools based on the unique needs of each student. For example, a school receives additional money for each English learner or exceptional education student it serves. No two students are the same, and Metro Schools' leadership recognizes that some students' needs cost more to meet.
